

The Pastor's Page

In recent months, several congregations across the country have experienced attacks during worship services. These events have naturally stirred concern, even fear, in many hearts. Our own congregation has begun to discuss new security procedures. These are serious and weighty matters. But as we enter these conversations, we must ask not only what should be done, but why. What is motivating us? Are we acting out of fear for ourselves or love for our neighbor?

Martin Luther's explanation of the Fifth Commandment offers a clear and helpful lens through which to view this discussion: "You shall not murder." What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not hurt or harm our neighbor in his body, but help and support him in every physical need.

Notice how Luther frames the commandment not only as a prohibition against harm but as a call to help. The commandment is not fulfilled merely by avoiding violence. It is fulfilled when we actively protect the life and well-being of others. To keep the Fifth Commandment is to live in self-giving love, guarding not only our own safety, but especially that of those around us.

This is where the difference between self-defense and neighbor-defense becomes crucial. Both may involve similar concerns and preparations. But the heart behind our actions makes all the difference.

Self-defense, when driven by fear, often narrows our view. We begin to see strangers as threats, our neighbors as liabilities, and our own lives as something to preserve at any cost. It asks, "What must I do to survive?"

Neighbor-defense, shaped by love, widens our concern. We see others not as threats but as fellow bearers of God's image, worth protecting and serving. It asks, "What can I do to keep others safe?"

Jesus says, "Greater love has no one than this, that someone lay down his life for his friends" (John 15:13). In other words, true love does not begin with self-preservation, but with self-sacrifice.

At the same time, we must also listen carefully to what Jesus says about violence. He tells us to "turn the other cheek" (Matthew 5:39), and when Peter drew his sword in Gethsemane, Jesus told him plainly, "Put it back in its place" (Matthew 26:52). Any conversation about protection must be guided by these words.

The call to defend our neighbor is not a license for hatred. Love never delights in force. It grieves every necessity that arises in a fallen world. As Christians, we are always called to seek peace, pray for our enemies, and entrust our lives to God.

That's why the tone of our planning matters. We are not assembling a militia. We are not building a fortress. We are a congregation of Christ's people, and He has called us to act in love. That means sober-minded vigilance, yes, but always directed toward the good of others, never simply the protection of ourselves.

These conversations won't always be easy. But they are necessary. And as we have them, we remember that our Lord Jesus did not cling to safety. He stepped into danger for us. He gave His life so that we might live. His death on the cross was the truest fulfillment of the Fifth Commandment: He did not harm His enemies, but instead bore harm for their sake.

So, as we plan and prepare, let us do so not with fear in our hearts, but with the love of Christ. Let us defend not only ourselves, but our neighbors. Let us build not only safe spaces, but holy ones. Places where the life of every person is treasured, protected, and cherished as a gift from God.

1 John 4:18 tells us, "Perfect love casts out fear." Let that be our goal: not perfect security, but perfect love. And where we fall short, we return again to the One who laid down His life for His friends, trusting in His mercy, walking in His love, and serving our neighbor in peace.

CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING

June 17, 2025

Call to Order: President Gene Cummins called the meeting to order.

Opening Prayer: Pastor Ketelsen opened the meeting with prayer.

Acceptance/Amendments of Agenda: Gene requests to add a new business item to the agenda for money that the school owes to the general fund. Jason Linneman motions to approve the agenda as revised. Gayle Linneman seconds. Revised agenda accepted.

Approve Minutes of April 15, 2025: Jason motions to approve minutes of the April 15 council meeting; Gaven Linneman seconds. The motion carries.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Ketelsen presents a verbal report:

- a. Installation of elected officers is tentatively scheduled for June 29 service.
- b. Men's Bible study is back in session. The Sunday morning study is wrapping up the current topic.
- c. A new member class is still being planned. There are 7 possible participants.
- d. Pastor will be on vacation July 7th through the 13th.
- e. The Feast of St. Peter and St. Paul will be celebrated with Holy Communion on June 29.

Reports of Officers:

- a. **President's Report:** Gene reports he is working with Glenda on her insurance supplement.
- b. Vice President's Report: No report.
- c. Secretary's Report: No report.
- d. Treasurer's Report: Chair Kim Toellner not present; written reports presented and discussed.
 - Pastor reports Kim has investigated moving from Southern Bank to BTC Bank. Additional ACH fees will be charged by BTC. Other fee structures are difficult to compare.
 - ii. No solar payments have been withdrawn by the solar company in over 2 years.
- e. **Elder's Report**: Chair Craig Meyer presents a verbal report:
 - Craig was elected Chair of the Board for the current term and Louis Stock was elected Secretary.
- f. Board of Property: Chair Darren Linneman reports the roof has been sealed around the cross as well as sealing of other minor spots. The

- contractor did not find any other obvious concerns, but we will continue to monitor for future leaks.
- g. Board of Christian Education/LYF: Chair Jasmine Campbell and Pastor Ketelsen report two additional volunteers are needed for VBS.
- h. **School Board:** Gayle Linneman presents a verbal report:
 - i. An application form for scholarship recipients has been developed.
 - ii. Scholarship applications that have been received will be reviewed by the Board.
- i. **Board of Stewardship/Outreach:** Chair Gaven Linneman presents a verbal report:
 - i. He is working on the 5th Sunday fellowship event for June 29.
 - ii. The church picnic will be on Sunday, September 28.

Craig motions to approve the board reports. Gaven seconds the motion, and it carries.

Unfinished Business

- a. Review sewer issues: Brian Weir Plumbing suggested a cleanout be installed between the building and the city main line to make it easier to clean out. They also suggest repairing the cleanout that is closest to the building. Bids were presented. After discussion, additional bids will be sourced.
- b. Review playground issues: Gaven reports on the scope and worksite plans. Following discussion, Craig motioned for Gaven to submit a bid that includes gravel removal, building of a block retaining wall, ground leveling and reinstallation of necessary fencing with a special Congregational Assembly meeting to be held June 29 to approve the bid. Darren seconds the motion and it carries.
- c. **Review downstairs bathroom remodel:** After discussion, bathroom remodel plans were tabled until after the playground project is confirmed.

New Business:

a. School Reimbursement to General Fund: Gene reports the school owes the general fund \$12,000. Gayle motions for \$6000 to be paid now and the Council will revisit issue in September. Gaven seconds. The motion carries.

Announcements: None.

Adjournment: Gaven motions to adjourn and Gayle seconds the motion. The meeting was adjourned.

Closing Prayer: Pastor asked everyone to join in praying the Lord's Prayer.
